**Dr. Robert E. Hunter** is a Senior Advisor at Rand Corporation. He was U.S. Ambassador to NATO under President Clinton and U.S. representative to the Western European Union; he was the principal architect of the "New NATO," leading the North Atlantic Council in implementing decisions of the 1994 and 1997 NATO Summits and in obtaining critical military decisions that halted the war in Bosnia. Dr. Hunter was the Director of West European Affairs and later the Director of Middle East Affairs on the National Security Council during the Carter administration, and a principal author of the Carter Doctrine for the Persian Gulf. He was foreign policy advisor to Senator Edward Kennedy and foreign and domestic policy advisor to Vice President Humphrey. He served on the White House staff in the Johnson administration and in the U.S. Department of the Navy on the Polaris project. He was Professorial Lecturer at the London School of Economics, Georgetown University, Johns Hopkins (SAIS) and George Washington University.



**Dr. Shireen T. Hunter** is a Visiting Professor at Georgetown University and Distinguished Scholar at the Center for Strategic and International Studies (CSIS) in Washington, D.C. She was Senior Fellow at the Centre for European Policy Studies in Brussels (1993-97), and Guest Scholar at the Brookings Institution and Research Fellow at the Harvard University Center for International Affairs. Dr. Hunter is a member of the Council on Foreign Relations. An internationally known authority on Iran and Islam, Dr. Hunter is author of many books including, *Iran's Foreign Policy in the Post-Soviet Era* (2010), *Islam in Russia* (2004), and *Islam: Europe's Second Religion* (2002), and over 40 book chapters and 30 journal articles.
